So you think you know Shirley! This column will challenge you every month with a new mystery to solve. The name of the person or place will be named and the following month information regarding the subject will be given to you. All places will be within the boundaries of Shirley. Sharpen your brain cells and beat the author.

PIGS ALLEY

Pig Alley was the name given to an area near McElroy's, that was off Fredonian St. where Credit Court Condominiums stand today. This housing was created by the Holbrook Mill for their workers. Boarding houses were for the unwed people, and small cottages for married workers. Most of these people were immigrants from Canada and Poland. The cottages were rented from the factory by the workers. The average pay for women and children between 1900 and 1920 was \$6.16 a week. Men averaged about \$2.00 more. It was a 60 hour week with Sunday the day of rest and recreation.

The houses were close together so there was not room to raise a cow. Pigs were the answer. They were fed garbage and they matured rapidly. Fall was harvest time. There was no refrigeration. The meat was salted and smoked. The heart and liver was consumed first as they would not 'keep.' Blood pudding was made at the time of the slaughtering. Head cheese, pig tail soup, smoked ham and smoked shoulders were some of the products. The pigs feet were pickled. Nothing was wasted. These frugal, hardworking people were a boom to the Town of Shirley. Many of their descendants live here today.
